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### Moving from Primary to Secondary School

At the end of Year 6, pupils move from primary school to Year 7 at secondary school. This is a big change. Changes are sometimes called 'transitions'.

Some pupils can feel a bit nervous or anxious about this change, this is OK. Some pupils feel excited about this change as it shows they are growing up and becoming more independent. You might feel nervous, excited or some other feeling. All these feelings and emotions are normal for children to feel at this time.

#### My Secondary School Times

One of the differences between primary and secondary school is the timings of the school day. Let's find out the timings for your secondary school:

Lunch at secondary school is usually 'cashless'. This doesn't mean you don't have to pay, it means you do not need to carry money to pay for your lunch. This is paid in advance and a machine reads your fingerprint or thumbprint to get pay your lunch!

## Travelling to Secondary School

Another difference with secondary school, is that it might be further away from your home (or it might be closer). How will you travel to your new secondary school?

## Finding Your Way around Secondary School

Another difference between primary and secondary school is that secondary schools are usually a lot bigger than primary schools. Look at your secondary school website to see the buildings, playgrounds and how big the school is.

Sometimes, Year 7 pupils may feel a little worried about getting lost, or not being able to find their classrooms in secondary school. Some secondary schools have numbers on the classroom doors, some have colour coded corridors.

#### Secondary School Lessons & Planners

Another big difference between primary school and secondary school is that you will have different subject lessons, in different classrooms with different teachers. For example, you may learn English, Maths, Science, French and Art in the same day, in different classrooms with different teachers! You can use your maps to begin with to find your way around school and between different classrooms.

But you do not need to worry about remembering all this information. When you first start at your secondary school, you will be given a **Planner** or **Contact Diary**. This is an important document as it contains lots of information about secondary school, has a diary for you to write in homework and other information for you.



#### Secondary School Timetables

Your planner or contact diary will also have space for your **Timetable**. Your timetable will tell you:

- Which lessons you have on which days
- Where each lesson will be
- Which teacher will teach each lesson

Your timetable will also show you how many lessons you have on each day – this can be different depending which school you go to. At secondary school lessons are usually called '**periods**'. Some secondary schools will have 5 periods a day, some will have 6 or maybe 7.

Another difference from primary school, is that most secondary schools have a **two-week** timetable so your lessons will be different every other week.

Let's have a look at some secondary school timetables and see if we can answer some questions.

See if you can answer these questions using the timetable to help: What lesson would you have Week A, Monday, Period 1? What lesson would you have Week B, Wednesday, Period 5? What time is lunch? Which room are Maths lessons in? How many periods are there between Break and Lunch? Secondary school timetables can be a bit confusing to start with but most Year 7 pupils quickly work out how to use them.

Remember - there are lots of people you can ask if you are confused.

#### Homework at Secondary School

At secondary school you will probably be asked to complete more homework than at primary school.

Why is it important to do homework?

- To finish work from a lesson
- To practice something you have learnt or learn something new
- To revise for a test or exam
- To show your teacher if you have understood the learning

It is a good idea to complete your homework on the evening it is given to you - this will help you to be organised with your time.

When your secondary school teacher gives you homework, they will probably ask you to write it down in your Planner or Contact Diary. The teacher may also record your homework on an online system which you can access via a computer at home.

Year 7 pupils often have lots of questions about homework - let's take the homework quiz on the next page to see how much you know!

#### Homework Quiz Answers

- 1. In Year 7, pupils are usually expected to spend 20-30 minutes per subject on their homework.
- 2. You may be given one or two subjects each evening. This means you spend about one hour each evening completing homework leaving lots of time for fun and relaxing too!
- 3. Ensure you understand your homework before leaving the lesson. If you forget or really do not understand, you can try your best, ask your parent or carer to help you or let your teacher know you need more help.
- 4. Homework Clubs are held in school at the end of the day. You can go there to complete your homework. There are teachers available to help you.
- 5. If you do not complete your homework or forget to hand it in, you may be asked to stay after school to complete it or get a mark which shows you have not done it. If you do this more than once, your teachers may not be happy and may speak to your parents to find out why you are not completing your homework.

Remember - if you do not understand, ask your teacher, teaching assistant, parent or other trusted adult for help!

# Equipment at Secondary School

Another difference between primary school and secondary school is you will need to bring your own equipment and keep it with you as you move between lessons throughout the day.

# Secondary School Rules

We all have to follow rules throughout our lives. Rules are usually based on the law of the country. Rules are there to govern and protect us. Without rules in schools, school could be unsafe and not allow learning to take place.

These are examples of some secondary school rules:

- Treat all pupils, staff and equipment with respect
- Arrive on time for the school day and all your lessons with the correct equipment
- Full school uniform should be worn at all times
- Complete homework on time and to your best ability

You might not like or agree with all the rules in secondary school but if you do not follow them, you may get a sanction. This might mean getting a 'detention'. A detention is a school sanction for not following the rules and may mean you have to stay after school for a short time or miss your break time one day.

### **Problem Solving**

# Rules on Mobile Phones at Secondary School

You may have a mobile phone when you go to secondary school. Secondary schools have different rules about the use of mobile phones in school.

- Some secondary schools do not allow you to have mobile phones at school
- Some secondary schools allow you to have a mobile phone as long as it is switched off at all times and not seen or heard
- Some secondary schools may ask you to hand your mobile phone into a teacher each morning and collect it at the end of the day
- Some secondary schools allow you to use your mobile phones at break and lunch time only

It is important to follow the rules on mobile phones in your school. See if you can find out what the rules on mobile phones are in your secondary school?

#### Meeting and Making New Friends

At primary school, you have probably known the children in your class for a long time, feel comfortable and have made friends with some of them.

When you move from primary to secondary school, some of your friends may go to different secondary schools so you may not see them every day anymore.

Going to secondary school can be different because there will be lots of new children. You won't know everyone and it may take a bit of time to feel like you 'belong' in your new school.

The important thing to remember is **EVERYONE** will feel the same way and that you're not alone. It's actually a good opportunity to make new friends and learn from adults who have lots of knowledge in their own subjects.
